It seems to me looking back at that it's that we in Britain have lost touch with what that was all about. Inevitably; because we've had bombs in our pubs and bombs in Manchester and bombs in London and soldiers killed. We forget that this whole thing didn't begin that way it began with people marching peacefully for change you know the civil rights movement was an exciting movement and it wasn't just made up with moderates. The truth about the civil rights movement is that there were people like John Hume but there were also people like Eamon McCann and Bernadette Devlin who were you know radical socialists or else revolutionary socialist politicians and everything in between There were republican elements. It was a very very broad movement.
